
I found 10 T-shirts and realize we sold a lot this year! So hope these cover most of your crew.

WW II LISTENING POSTS

Radio Listening Posts were established by the Federal Communications Commission within the United States to listen to radio traffic during World War II. One of these was at Scituate, Rhode Island. Others were at Fort Ward (Washington), Winter Harbor, Maine, Amagansett, New York, Cheltenham, Maryland and Jupiter, Florida.

About one year before the United States entered WW2, Thomas B. Cave was sent to Rhode Island to set up a secret radio listening post. The purpose of the post was to detect radio transmissions from German spies in the United States and assist in locating downed aircraft. In March 1941 he abandoned his first choice of Greenville, RI for a farmhouse with 183 acres of land located on Darby Road near Chopmist Hill in Scituate, Rhode Island. The FCC leased the farmhouse from Mr. William A. Suddard.

The completed listening post contained over 80,000 feet of wire, 11 antennas and many advanced radio receivers. The site included two direction finding antennas. These could be rotated to get a bearing on the transmitting station. This information when compared with similar measurements from other distant stations allowed the transmitting location to be triangulated. The use of two of these antennas meant both parties in a conversion could be located.

Countries heard

Caribbean: The quick response of this station allowed it to home in on German submarines in the Caribbean prompting the supervisor to state that "we were practically in on the kill" when describing the destruction of German Submarines.

Africa: From West Africa a large variety of clandestine radio transmitters was detected. In the African desert not only were the German command center-to-tank transmissions received but also tank-to-tank transmissions were clearly audible. The reception of these signals helped to turn the tide in the North Africa campaign.

South America: From South America spies transmitting back to Germany were detected and most countries cooperated in efforts to shut down the transmissions. The one exception to this was Argentina with its Pro-Nazi Sympathies.

One report sent to German submarines contained the scheduled departure date of the Queen Mary as well as its intended route to Australia. The destruction of this ship along with its 14,000 soldiers would have been a heavy blow but this was prevented by the eavesdropping ability of Chopmist Hill.

Pacific Ocean: From the Pacific Ocean signals were picked up of TNT-carrying Japanese balloons that had been released to follow the jet stream to the United States. The positions of theses balloons was transmitted to Allied forces who shot them down.

East Coast: On the East Coast of the United States from Labrador to Florida signals of lost planes were picked up. Their position was triangulated and instructions to the planes were transmitted to enable them to arrive in the United States. This action saved thousands of people including actress Kay Francis who was returning home after a USO tour.

Germany: Vital local weather reports for the Germany homeland were purposely transmitted on frequencies that did not reach England but these transmissions were detected at Chopmist Hill.

Disbelief from the Army: Approximately 127 tests were made to ensure the site was able to accomplish what it claimed to do. In one test a station was set up in the Pentagon with a wire hanging out a window to transmit a signal. The object was to see how long it would take various receiving stations to detect this signal. Chopmist Hill detected it in seven minutes.

ALFRED VAIL

One of the witnesses of the Morse 1837 demonstration of the telegraph at the College of New York was a young man named Alfred Vail. Vail's family owned the Speedwell Ironworks near Morristown, NJ. Alfred had grown up around the ironworks and was quite familiar with working with and building mechanical devices with iron. He was particularly intrigued with Morse's demonstration and could foresee many obvious improvements to Morse's poor design. Vail was so excited about the potential of the Morse telegraph that he offered to refine the Morse design at his expense but wanted a 25% share of any future profits. This Morse agreed to as long as all patent rights remained with Morse.

When Morse consulted Joseph Henry to learn how to build a better electromagnet, Vail was present and quickly built an intensity electromagnet per Henry's specification that worked superbly. Vail replaced the pencil on the end of Morse's pendulum with a pen and shortened the length of the pendulum to get faster response. When Vail found that the ink from the pen splashed out with the rapid side-to-side motion, he changed the orientation so the electromagnet pulled the pen against the moving paper strip while a spring pulled the pen off the paper when the electromagnet was de-energized. The resulting Vail register or inker was far superior to the Morse design.

For transmitting the series of dots for the different messages, Vail threw out the notched stick of Morse and replaced it with a hand key that would make the series of dots by simply pumping the handle of the key up and down. The resulting Vail key is strikingly similar to our contemporary straight telegraph key. All of these improvements were done at the Speedwell Ironworks with little input from Morse.

When a corrupt politician in Washington insisted on a piece of the action in order to support Morse's request for government funding, Morse had to cut Vail's share of profits from 25% to 12.5%. Interestingly, Morse retained his 50% share. Vail spent his share of the profits to support his family and was doing so poorly financially that he dropped out of the telegraph business in 1848 and died 10 years later in poverty. At the time of Vail's death, Morse

finally got a royalty settlement of \$80,000 from Europe and gave Vail's widow \$5000 of it (the corrupt politician got \$7500).

As an aside, Alfred Vail's first cousin, Theodore Vail was instrumental in forming AT&T about 20 years later and served as its first President.

If Vail was so instrumental in developing the telegraph, why isn't his name on any of the key patents? The answer is simple. As a condition of employment, Morse insisted that any inventions of his workers would be patented under the Morse name. Morse wanted the world to think that his superior telegraph was his and his alone. So now you know.

BOOK REVIEW

The book "Understanding, Building, and Using Baluns and Ununs" by Jerry Sevick, W2FMI was recently donated to the GSARA library by KJI Electronics. This is an update and review of the 4 editions of Jerry's book, "Transmission Line Transformers" published between 1987 and 2001. This book is divided into two parts – Part I on Understanding Baluns and Ununs and Part II on Building and Using Baluns and Ununs.

I was disappointed in Part I as I felt that Jerry's explanations were a bit vague and too brief for someone wanting to learn how these baluns and ununs work. If you want an explanation of the theory and operation of these transmission line transformers, you will find a better treatment in the earlier books (and even they are not great – just better than this book).

Part II of the book really shines as a tutorial of the many practical aspects of making baluns and ununs. Here, Jerry's vast experience shines through as he tells of the difficulties likely encountered when you wind your own transformers. If you're thinking of building your own balun or unun of whatever impedance ratio, you should refer to appropriate parts in Part II of this book. For practical tips on building your own baluns and ununs as well as the type of performance you can expect, Part II of this book is for you.

To understand how baluns and ununs work, I'd recommend Jerry's earlier books.
