FCC HAS NEW RULES FOR 60 METERS

On November 18, the FCC released a Report and Order (R&O), defining new rules for the 60 meter (5 MHz) band. The new rules will not go into effect until 30 days after being published in the Federal Register, which has not yet happened. These rules are in response to a Petition for Rulemaking filed by the ARRL more than five years ago and a June 2010 Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. In the R&O, the FCC replaced one of the channels, increased the maximum authorized power amateur stations may transmit and authorized amateur stations to use three additional emission designators. NEW MEXICO FOX HUNT SUCCESSFUL

Results of the USA's 11th national championships of Amateur Radio Direction Finding (ARDF) are in the record books. Members of Albuquerque Amateur Radio Club went all out to provide a top-notch experience for fans of on-foot transmitter hunting, also called radio-orienteeing and foxtailing. They came from 10 states and four other nations to see who would win medals by finding transmitters in the forests of central and northern New Mexico. From September 14-18, competitors took to the woods with directional antennas and receivers. They navigated not with GPS sets, but with maps and compasses. Their goal was to find all of their required transmitters and to get to the finish line in the shortest elapsed time. For fairness, the organizers didn't disclose the exact sites of the competition in advance. That kept anyone from doing advance reconnaissance in person or via Google Earth. THE NATIONAL TRAFFIC SYSTEM

The American Radio Relay League was founded in 1914 because Hiram Percy Maxim could not get a message via wireless from Hartford, Connecticut to Springfield, Massachusetts -- a distance of only about 30 miles. He had to rely on another wireless operator in Agawam, Massachusetts to relay his message to its intended recipient. This was the very beginning of what is now the National Traffic System (NTS). But what is the NTS?

The [Public Service Communications Manual](#) defines the NTS as "a structure that allows for rapid movement of message traffic from origin to destination and training amateur operators to handle written traffic and participate in directed nets. These two objectives are the underlying foundations of the NTS. It's a system that operates daily, even continuously, with advanced digital links."

The NTS consists of operators who usually participate for one or two periods a week and some who are active daily. The National Traffic System is an organized effort to handle traffic in accordance with a plan that is easily understood, and employs modern methods of network traffic handling. The NTS is not intended as a deterrent or competition for the many independently organized traffic networks. When necessitated by overload or lack of outlet for traffic, the facilities of such networks can function as alternate traffic routings where this is indicated in the best interest of efficient message relay and/or delivery.

One of the most important features of NTS is the system concept. No NTS net is an independent entity that can conduct its activities without concern for or consideration of other NTS nets. Each net performs its function and only its function in the overall organization. If nets fail to perform their functions or perform functions intended for other nets, the overall system may be adversely affected. Nets may sometimes adopt temporary measures to ensure the movement of traffic.

According to [ARES® E-Letter](#) Editor Rick Palm, K1CE, the best way to get to know the National Traffic System is to hook up with a local NTS traffic net in your area where messages (Radiograms) are entered and others are accepted for delivery by mail or phone. Local clubs, repeater groups and ARES operators are all good sources for local info on NTS activity.

LOTW BACKLOG IS CLEARING

Logbook of The World (LoTW) is continuing to accept and process logs, including logs from this weekend's ARRL November Phone Sweepstakes Contest. Currently, the processing delay is at 30 hours, down from 45 hours last week. As of November 23, there are approximately 857,000 QSOs in 3335 logs still waiting to be processed. If you have already uploaded a log, please do not upload it again; by doing so, you will only add to the queue. Do not send entire logs that contain previously uploaded QSOs; use the date range option when signing logs, selecting only those QSOs in a specific date range to upload to LoTW. By following these guidelines, you'll help LoTW process the backlog at a faster pace. Thanks again for your patience.

USA GOLD AT CW CHAMPIONSHIP

Back in September 1936, Eugene A. Hubbell, W9ERU, took home the silver trophy at what the October 1936 issue of QST called the first official "Amateur Code Speed Contest." Only making one error, Hubbell won first prize with his winning speed of receiving 52.2 words per minute. Held at the ARRL Central Division Convention that year, the contest required operators to decipher plain language text at two minute intervals that ranged in speed from 25 to 52.7 words per minute. But things have changed since Hubbell made history. Today, individuals all over the world compete in High Speed Telegraphy (HST) events where they are challenged to correctly receive and copy Morse code transmissions sent at very high speeds, upwards of 300 characters a minute.

According to Barry Kutner, W2UP, HST has long been considered a sport in Europe, especially Eastern Europe, similar to chess or an Olympic sport. This year, Team USA -- consisting of Kutner, Kennan Low, KE3X, and Kody Low, K3ODY - placed 10th at the Ninth High Speed Telegraphy IARU World Championship in Bielefeld, Germany this past October. Kutner won a gold medal -- the first in HST history to a non-European -- in the pileup competition, and a bronze medal in the RUFZ competition. Read more [here](#).

BPL RULES TIGHTENED SOME

On October 24, 2011, the FCC released the Second Report and Order in its proceeding -- now in its 9th year -- to adopt rules for Access Broadband over Power Line (BPL) systems. The Second Report and Order is the final step in the Commission's effort to comply with the directives of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, which in April 2008 ordered the FCC to correct errors it had committed in the course of adopting rules in 2004. The Court acted in response to a Petition for Review filed by the ARRL.

In July 2009, the FCC issued a Request for Further Comment and Further Notice of Proposed Rule Making in which it proposed slight modification of measurement standards for determining whether a BPL system is in compliance with the maximum allowable levels of radiated emissions. In response, the ARRL argued that coupled with a scientifically valid extrapolation factor for determining those levels, mandatory notching of the amateur bands to a level 35 dB below the general emission limit would reduce the likelihood of harmful interference to amateur stations to a level that would permit any remaining harmful interference to be remedied on a case-by-case basis. The ARRL noted that its request for mandatory notching simply reflected the best practices of the BPL industry.

In the Second Report and Order, the Commission decided not to adopt its own proposal and also declined to adopt the ARRL's request for mandatory notching. Instead, the Commission has increased the requirement for BPL systems to be able to notch frequency bands to at least 25 dB, an increase of 5 dB from the existing requirement of 20 dB. The Commission also made technical adjustments to its rules for determining the distance between a power line and a measurement antenna and for determining site-specific extrapolation factors. SKYWARN RECOGNITION DAY DEC. 3


The 13th Annual SKYWARN Recognition Day (SRD) Special Event will take place Saturday, December 3, 2011. SRD is co-sponsored by the

ARISSAT-1 MAY DE-ORBIT IN APRIL

According to [predictions](#) from Mineo Wakita, JE9PEL, the [ARISSat-1](#) satellite is due to re-enter Earth's atmosphere in early April 2012. Launched

from the International Space Station on August 8, the satellite is traveling in a low orbit and is steadily losing altitude. The rate of orbital decay may be accelerated by increasing atmospheric density caused by increased solar activity. With that factor in mind, some ARISSat-1 decay predictions suggest re-entry as early as February 1. ARISSat-1 remains quite active, sending voice messages, digital telemetry and Slow Scan TV images. Amateurs have also been able to enjoy contacts through ARISSat-1's linear transponder despite the fact that the UHF antenna was apparently damaged prior to (or during) deployment. Last month, AMSAT-NA announced a [competition](#) to see who can record the last bits of telemetry as ARISSat-1 makes its final plunge. To decode the CW or BPSK telemetry you must use the [ARISSATTLM software](#) for Windows or Mac OS. The CW signal is transmitted at 145.919 MHz and the BPSK signal appears at 145.920 MHz, plus or minus Doppler.

PATRON SAINT OF AMATEURS

Did you know that the Catholic Church has named a Patron Saint of amateur radio operators? He is none other than Saint Maximilian Kolbe, SP3RN-SK from Poland.

Raymond (Rajmund) Kolbe was born on January 8, 1894 in Zduńska Wola, which was then part of the Russian Empire. As a young boy, he prayed to Our Lady of Czestochowa and received a vision which he later described: "That night, I asked the Mother of God what was to become of me. Then she came to me holding two crowns, one white, and the other red. She asked me if I was willing to accept either of these crowns. The white one meant that I should persevere in purity and the red that I should become a martyr. I said that I would accept them both."

In 1907, Kolbe and his elder brother Francis entered the Conventual Franciscan junior seminary in Lwów. In 1910 he entered the novitiate and professed his first vows in 1911, adopting the name Maximilian (Maksymilian). He was sent to Kraków in 1912 and then to Rome where he studied philosophy, theology, mathematics and physics. He professed his final vows in 1914 adopting the names Maximilian Maria to show his veneration of the Blessed Virgin Mary. While in Rome, he earned a doctorate in philosophy in 1915 at the Pontifical Gregorian University and a doctorate in theology in 1919 at the Pontifical University of St. Bonaventure.

In 1918 Kolbe was ordained a priest and in 1919 he returned to newly independent Poland. In 1927 he founded and supervised the friary of Niepokalanów (the "City of the Immaculate") near Warsaw. Between 1930 and 1936, Fr. Kolbe took a series of missions to Japan where he founded a monastery at the outskirts of Nagasaki which remains to this day a prominent Roman Catholic monastery in Japan. The monastery was located on a mountainside that, according to Shinto beliefs, was not the side best suited to be in harmony with nature. When the atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki, Kolbe's monastery was saved because the other side of the mountain took the main force of the blast.

In 1936, Fr. Kolbe returned to Poland and became the superior of the friary of Niepokalanów. On October 28, 1938 a radio license for test broadcasting was issued with the call SP3RN (Radio Niepokalanów) and a station constructed at

the friary. The first broadcast took place on December 8, 1938. The exact type of radio station is unclear. It was a shortwave station but whether it was amateur or a test broadcast station is unclear. Fr. Kolbe used his amateur radio skills to vilify Nazi activities through his reports.

Shortly after the Germans invaded Poland in 1939, Fr. Kolbe was arrested and imprisoned at Amtitz. He was released only to be arrested again on February 17, 1941 and imprisoned in the Pawiak prison. On May 28, he was transferred to Auschwitz as prisoner #16670.

At the end of July, a prisoner disappeared from the camp, prompting the camp commander to pick 10 men to be starved to death in an underground bunker in order to deter further escape attempts. (The man who had disappeared was later found drowned in the camp latrine.) When one of the selected men, Franciszek Gajowniczek cried out, "My wife! My children!" Fr. Kolbe volunteered to take his place.

After two weeks in the starvation cell, Fr. Kolbe was the only prisoner still alive. The guards wanted the bunker emptied so Kolbe was given a lethal injection of carbolic acid and died on August 14. His remains were cremated the next day, August 15, the feast of the Assumption of Mary.

Father Kolbe was beautified as a confessor by Pope Paul VI in 1971 and canonized as a Martyr of Charity by Pope John Paul II on October 10, 1982. Franciszek Gajowniczek, the condemned man who St. Kolbe replaced, was in attendance for the canonization (he died in 1995, aged 94.) St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe is the Patron Saint of Amateur Radio Operators.

The correct countries and continents are as follows:

HB9MBX – Switzerland, Europe
JG1ILF – Japan, Asia
OZ9CR – Denmark, Europe
PZ1DR – Suriname, South America
RW4NN – Russia, Europe
TG9HW – Guatemala, North America
VK3ACR – Australia, Oceania
VO2GB – Laborador, North America
YV1ACX – Venezuela, South America
ZS5JL – South Africa, Africa

PUZZLE #14 – ANT ON CUBE EDGES

To practice his soldering skills, a ham friend made up a cube using 12 pieces of wire, each 3 inches long. This made the frame of a cube, 3 inches on each side. An ant on one corner of the cube proceeded to crawl along the wire edge spreading a pheromone along the wire so it would not crawl along that wire again. When it came to a corner, the ant defecated and proceeded along another edge. Because of the defecation, it would not come back to any corner visited.
