NJ QSO PARTY RESULTS

GSARA participated in the NJ QSO Party on October 4. A total of 154 QSOs were made by five GSARA operators: Len, WA1PCY (50 on 15m SSB), Ray, WA1FFI (3 on 40m SSB), Ned, KC2HCY (52 on 40m SSB); Bruce, K2QXW (8 on 40m CW); and John, KA2F (40 on 20m & 40m CW and 1 on 20m SSB).

Despite having to battle with California QSO Party operators (in CA and DXlands) this year's radio work and fun was quite a bit better than last year.

Two operators noted how the QSO PARTY was good training, fighting QRM, pulling out calling stations from the noise, getting repeats, etc. with the result of great personal satisfaction in handling Field Day-like situations. Contests are also great for emergency preparedness training. All noted how the NJ QSO PARTY was **FUN**.

Old Business

The following motion was made by Marty, N2BMK and seconded by Bill, NJ2H:

1. That GSARA host a luncheon December 6, 2014 at 2:00 PM in Schneider's Restaurant, 801 Main St., Avon-by-the-Sea to celebrate Bob Buus, W2OD as GSARA Amateur of the Year 2014 and to gather GSARA members and family at a social setting.

It was also reported that there are sufficient VE volunteers to cover the October 25 VE session.

The purpose is to encourage more activity from club members, especially the new younger members. John, KA2F is aware of these proposals and is coordinating them with various comments from the members. This he plans to share with the members at some time in the future.

The GSARA library is growing and we need a better place for the many books. John, KA2F asked if any members might have a stand-alone bookcase that could be used for this. Howard, W2HTS thought that the Red Cross might be able to help us with this.

JACK CONNERS, WA2ADQ - SK

John J. "Jack" Connors, WA2ADQ, a 61 year Shrewsbury resident, died Saturday, October 4, 2014 at Riverview Medical Center at the age of 88. Jack was born in Spring Lake to John J. and Lillian Connors. He was a longtime communicant of St. Anthony of Padua RC Church in Red Bank. He also was a 50 year member and ex-Captain of [Shrewsbury First Aid Squad](#) and Life Member of the Shrewsbury Fire Department. He was employed by Fort Monmouth and retired as Quality Assurance Director after over 30 years of service. He then worked for 25 years at Monmouth Race Track. Jack honorably served our country in the US Army and Navy during [WWII](#) and is the recipient of a [Purple Heart](#). As an EMT Instructor Jack has impacted the lives of thousands of people.

He is predeceased by his parents. Jack is survived by beloved wife of 63 years, Jenny (Figaro) Connors, his sons; John J. Connors Jr. and his wife Elizabeth of Eatontown and Mark D. Connors and his wife Deborah of Jackson, 6 grandchildren; Michael, Kelly, Christopher, Sean, Lisa and Mackenzie, 5 great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Visitation was held on Wednesday October 8th from 3-7pm at the John E. Day Funeral Home, 85 Riverside Avenue, Red Bank. A Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated on Thursday, October 9th at St. Anthony of Padua RC Church, 121 Bridge Ave., Red Bank. Interment was at Mt. Olivet Cemetery, Middletown.

HAM RADIO SERVICE FIT FOR A KING

As we know, in the earliest days amateur radio operators received less than a welcoming reception from the general public and commercial and military radio concerns; we were “hams” and confined to the useless frequencies 160 meters and higher for our amateur dabbling.

All this changed rapidly once hams showed what great service amateur radio could provide. It was 1913 when all telephone and telegraph lines were destroyed and roads were impassable due to a slate of severe storms and flooding in Michigan and Ohio. People were isolated in their towns and cities until college students and hams began passing disaster messages to the outside world. ARRL was started the next year--the American Radio Relay League--promoting the service aspect of the amateur radio hobby. Field Day was first held in 1933 to encourage hams to test their emergency preparedness and in 1935 the ARRL Emergency Corps was begun, the forerunner of ARES, Amateur Radio Emergency Service.

Hams in the Jersey Shore Amateur Radio Association and the Monmouth County Radio Club (both clubs the forerunner of Garden State ARA) had been staging successful Field Day operations for some six years when a practical opportunity for Emergency Service presented itself in Red Bank, N.J. in June 1939.

Americans, ever fascinated by British royalty, were delighted to read of the month-long visit of the royal family to North America, first to Canada and then to the United States. Here in America King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, the parents of the present Queen Elizabeth II, visited Washington, D.C. and then traveled by a special train to Red Bank, where they changed to automobiles for a ride to Sandy Hook; here a royal destroyer took them to New York City (for a World's Fair visit) and then to President Roosevelt's home in Hyde Park, N.Y. It is said that the U.S. phase of the visit was to introduce isolationist America to the British monarchs and to allow the President to speak privately with the British head-of-state to discuss eventual U.S. assistance once World War II broke out in Europe.

According to press reports, huge crowds, sometimes unmanageable, wanted to see the King and Queen in Washington. Red Bank and N.J. authorities realized local crowds would be just as thick so plans were set down to formally welcome the royal party at the Red Bank station and provide for the safety of them and the crowds of spectators there and on their route through town, down Rumson Road to Sea Bright and to Sandy Hook.



Now came the time for amateur radio to render its service. Five hams volunteered to handle communications: Robert Johnson Jr. W2AWL, Chester Sharp W2HWX, Richard Hammell W2FRC, Edwin Chinnock W2FZY and Bud Brager. Lacking VHF FM 2 meter radio and a repeater, it is likely they operated 40 meter CW for all were expert high speed operators.

“They worked under the supervision of Councilman Harold Allen and operated from the water works on Chestnut St. for the benefit of the fire and street departments. Their purpose was to deliver all messages and to tell of street conditions. Robert Johnson, Jr., supervised transmissions from Bradley’s radio store. Other operators were Chester Sharp located at Branch Ave. and Harding Rd.; Richard Hammell located at Bradley’s at the central transmitter; Edwin Chinnock located at Mount English Co. (Maple Ave. and Monmouth St.; “Bud” Brager located at the Chestnut St. plant. Their work with borough officials was greatly appreciated.”

Additional comments from John, KA2F:

The Bradley's radio store referred to in the article was located on the corner of Newman Springs Rd. and Shrewsbury Ave. and in 1939 was expanded. This later became Monmouth Radio, known to all as an alternative for Atkinson and Smith's. Bradley and family lived above the shop or in its rear.

The King and Queen were polite as always and never mingled with their people. The church kids from Highlands were lined up along Ocean Ave. waving little American and Brit flags and prepared to sing to the royals. It had been rehearsed

for weeks. Unfortunately, King George VI knew nothing of it and may well have stammered "Ddddo Nnnnot Sssstop. Jjjust Kkkeep Gggoing." (Remember the film, the "King's Speech"?) The entourage blew the kids away as it sped up to the Army road at Ft. Hancock.

Ironic that it was under George III that the colonies revolted and now George VI is hailed by crowds.

The same thing took place inside Sandy Hook at the new memorial hastily erected to memorialize the 14 British seamen who died December 30-31, 1782 from exposure in a blizzard and were buried in a common grave near the memorial. Scouts and soldiers and civilians were on hand with a wreath for the King or Queen to lay at the monument where their ancestral sailors died in his majesty's service at the end of the revolution. All were disappointed. Perhaps it was lack of concern or caring; perhaps it was because the Queen could not wait to get aboard the destroyer to pee--too much tea can do that! The monument still stands.

HAM RADIO MOON ORBITER

The Manfred Memorial Moon Mission (4M) [lunar flyby experiment](#), which will carry an Amateur Radio payload, was scheduled to launch from China on October 23 with lunar flyby to occur, nominally, on October 28. During the lunar flyby, the spacecraft will be about nearly 248,000 miles from Earth and between 7440 and 14,480 miles from the Moon.

The ham radio payload will transmit continuously on 145.990 MHz using JT65B mode, which can be decoded using a [version](#) of the free [WJST](#) software that Joe Taylor, K1JT, developed especially for this mission.

The launch was set for approximately 1759 UTC on October 23, and the lunar flyby will take place at 0033 UTC on October 28. 4M is expected to begin transmitting on October 23 around 1920 UTC. Ground stations in the Southern Hemisphere are best situated to [listen](#) for the spacecraft's first signals.

The onboard transmitter will put 1.5 W into a quarter-wave monopole antenna. Read [more](#). -- *Thanks to LUXspace, AMSAT-UK, AMSAT News Service*

RUNNER ALAN SHERMAN, W2NIR

Did you know that GSARA member Alan Sherman, W2NIR is about to participate in his 34th New York City Marathon on November 2? Alan ran his first New York Marathon in 1979 and successfully completed 32 in a row by 2012 when Sandy hit and the Marathon was canceled that year. Not to be stopped by a little thing like Hurricane Sandy, Alan simply went over to the 400-meter track at Shore Regional High School and did 26.2 laps to mimic the distance of the marathon. And he did it at his "normal" 14-minute mile racewalk pace (for the past 12 years he has been race walking rather than running the marathon).

In 2013, Alan again started the NY Marathon but had to drop out about half-way through. He is now preparing for his 33rd successful race on November 2. We wish him the best! As he prepares for this marathon, Alan said, "My only hope is that we have a good tail wind and my physical stamina holds up. It's an amazing event when you consider that the guy on my right might be from Europe and the one on my left from Asia. It's truly an international event."

The New York Road Runners club honors the Marathon's most dedicated runners in their 15+ Club which is a group of 1018 runners from 24 countries who have completed at least 15 New York City Marathons. The top runner has completed 38 finishes. Two have 36 and 9 have 35. Alan will have 33 if he completes the November 2 Marathon which will put him in this very elite top group of runners. Congratulations to Alan for this notable achievement.

Alan has also successfully run in the Jersey Shore and Boston Marathons. While in Florida, he participates in half-marathons in Miami and Ft. Lauderdale.

Oh, I forgot to mention, Alan is 78 years old. How many of us younger than Alan would even consider running a marathon? How about running 33 of them? It boggles the mind!

TEN YEARS AGO

From the November 2004 Propagator: Jeff, N2LXM and Marty, WN2DX organized special event station K2USA at Ft. Monmouth on October 9 with about 12 GSARA participants. The included new Roster shows 68 members.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

From the November 1999 Propagator: Special event stations to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Marconi's successful operation from Twin Lights were on the air for most of October. OMARC operated N2MO with 819 contacts, GSARA operated W2GSA for over 530 contacts, GSARA also operated from Al Emer's (N2YAC-SK) sailboat in NY harbor as W2OD for 131 contacts. Finally, QCWA operated WA2GM for about 552 contacts. Thus, a total of over 2000 contacts were made by the various stations. Jean Shepherd, K2ORS became a silent key.

From the November, 1994 Propagator: This double issue Propagator had 16 pages of news and information plus a 4-page roster showing 132 members. The Shore Area Hamfest at Brookdale College was very successful and profitable. We sold 72 indoor tables and 160 tailgate spaces. The 50-50 netted \$480 and 43 people were processed in the VE test session. The nominating committee could find no one willing to run for President or Treasurer. President Bob, W2OD offered to again run for President but someone else would have to take over the Propagator. At the October 19 meeting, Rich DiFiore, KB2NXA (SK) was nominated to run for President and Dave Worrell, N2IRO was nominated to run for Treasurer. Both accepted the nomination. Brad Dargue, KT2U (SK) and Bob Buus, W2OD set up W2GSA as a portable station at Quail Hill Scout Camp for JOTA. Many scouts got on 20 meters as well as 2 meters and talked to other scouts. A report written by Weblos Pack 155 was published on page 6. The FCC is considering vanity call signs and has proposed a \$70 fee for 10 years. The ARRL proposed a one-time fee of \$150 instead.
